

Grammar workbooks

If you feel that you would like extra grammar practise, we highly recommend that you buy this book. It has good explanations and is great for practising all the grammar and key structures that you are expected to know. It is also a great place for you to keep all your progress in one place and will serve as a useful reference when you begin the A Level course. Read

Keep your own vocabulary book for new expressions you come across. You could order it alphabetically, by topic area, type of word or just as a notebook /diary where you scribble away your Spanish development in it.

Newspapers and magazines

Read a foreign language newspaper – El País in Spanish is available in larger paper shops or via its own website <u>www.elpaís.com</u> so that you can read the paper online. You do not have to read the paper cover to cover (!), just scan the headlines and pick out ONE article that grabs your attention.

This website is a more lighthearted newspaper which covers global stories as well as gossip (<u>www.20minutos.es</u>). Also try <u>www.20minutos.tv</u>. This is the TV Channel for this newspaper.

<u>https://verne.elpais.com/</u> explores what's trending on the Internet (the latest memes, Internet challenges, etc.).

In Spain there is also a news website for young people <u>www.primerasnoticias.com</u>. It has sections on the Internet & Mobile technology, Science and Wildlife, Education, Culture, Sport and Society and Health.

Top tip: Download the Google Chrome Language Learning extension and build your listening comprehension with thousands of hours of authentic language in context. After installation, you will have additional features for language learning when you watch videos on the Netflix website.

• Subtitles are shown in two languages, allowing you to compare the original audio and text with a translation in your language.

- The extension allows you to listen to subtitles one at a time, and to change the playback speed.
- There's a pop-up dictionary, and the extension suggest the most important words for you to learn.

Online dictionary

A good online dictionary is <u>www.wordreference.com</u>

Top Tip: Don't look up every word you are not sure of when reading an artcile / book.

Skim and scan the text to get the gist. Remember to use the context or the artcile, cognate and common sense to figure out what the article is saying. Pick out a couple of words that you like the look of, that you feel may be real hurdles to getting the idea of the text, look them up carefully and add them to your vocab booklet. The aim at this stage is to get the gist of the article, not to be able to translate it completely. Translation is a whole different ball game and you will learn it soon enough.

You will be surprised how much more enjoyable reading will be if you really pay attention to this tip.

Find out about Spain and/or Spanish-speaking countries

Throughout the A-Level course, you will be learning about the history, society, politics and culture of the Spanish-speaking world. Choose a country, region or one of the areas mentioned here to develop your knowledge and understanding further and see where Google takes you! If you have a love of art – investigate Spanish or Latin American art! If you love a good debate – find out what is in the news in Spanish speaking countries and decide what you think about that.
